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Re: Infringement of Intellectual Property Rights of Public Knowledge Project

We act for the Public Knowledge Project (“PKP”) based at the Simon Fraser University Library.

It has recently come to our client’s attention that you have substantially reproduced PKP’s original documentation for versions 2.0 and 3.0 of its Open Journal Systems software (the “**Work**”) on the “OJS Knowledge Center” section of your website at openjournalssystems.com (the “**Website**”).


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In breach of our client’s rights and the License, you have posted the Work on the Website without PKP’s copyright statement or any reference to the License, in a manner that is likely to cause members of the public to incorrectly believe that openjournalssystems.com and/or the Website are somehow affiliated with or endorsed by PKP.

Our client has made a substantial investment in the Work, and the required attribution, which ensures that PKP (SFU Library) is acknowledged as the source of the Work, is critical to PKP’s efforts to secure the research and development support needed to keep the Work current, innovative, and available for all. Our client is therefore not prepared to allow this unlawful activity to continue.

If you do not bring your posting of the Work on the Website into compliance with the License by restoring PKP's copyright statement and reference to the License as they appear on the original PKP source documents by 4:00 pm PST on **Tuesday, January 10, 2017**, our client will have no choice but to take further action to protect its legal rights.
